Professor Ranga, on behalf of the Swatantra Party, explained that, while they sympathised with the efforts of the Home Minister to supplement official action in regard to combatting corruption by non-official effort and while they agreed that vigilance on the part of citizens generally can be a factor in combatting corruption, the main cause of corruption prevalent today in this country was the existence of shortages and the control exercised the Administration to allocate scarce resources by a system of permits, licences and quotas. It was the existence of discrimination vested in those in authority that was the biggest single cause of corruption rampant in this country and so long as these policies were not abandoned, there was no hope of any material change in the situation. Professor explained that they did not think it was proper for political parties to get involved in activities such as those of the Sadachar Samiti. Vigilance activities against corruption should be left entirely to the voluntary action of individual citizens irrespective of their political predilections and it was important that ~~political~~ politics should be kept out of such activities. They do not feel that any helpful purpose would be served either to the Sadachar Samiti or to political parties by ^{any} ~~any~~ ~~the~~ association of these two kinds of activities which it is desirable to keep apart. The Swatantra Party, therefore, felt compelled to regret its inability to associate itself as a Party with this move.
