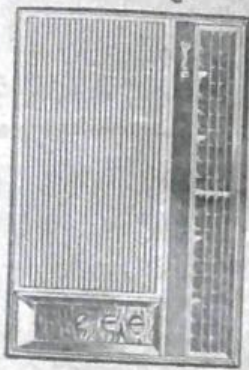

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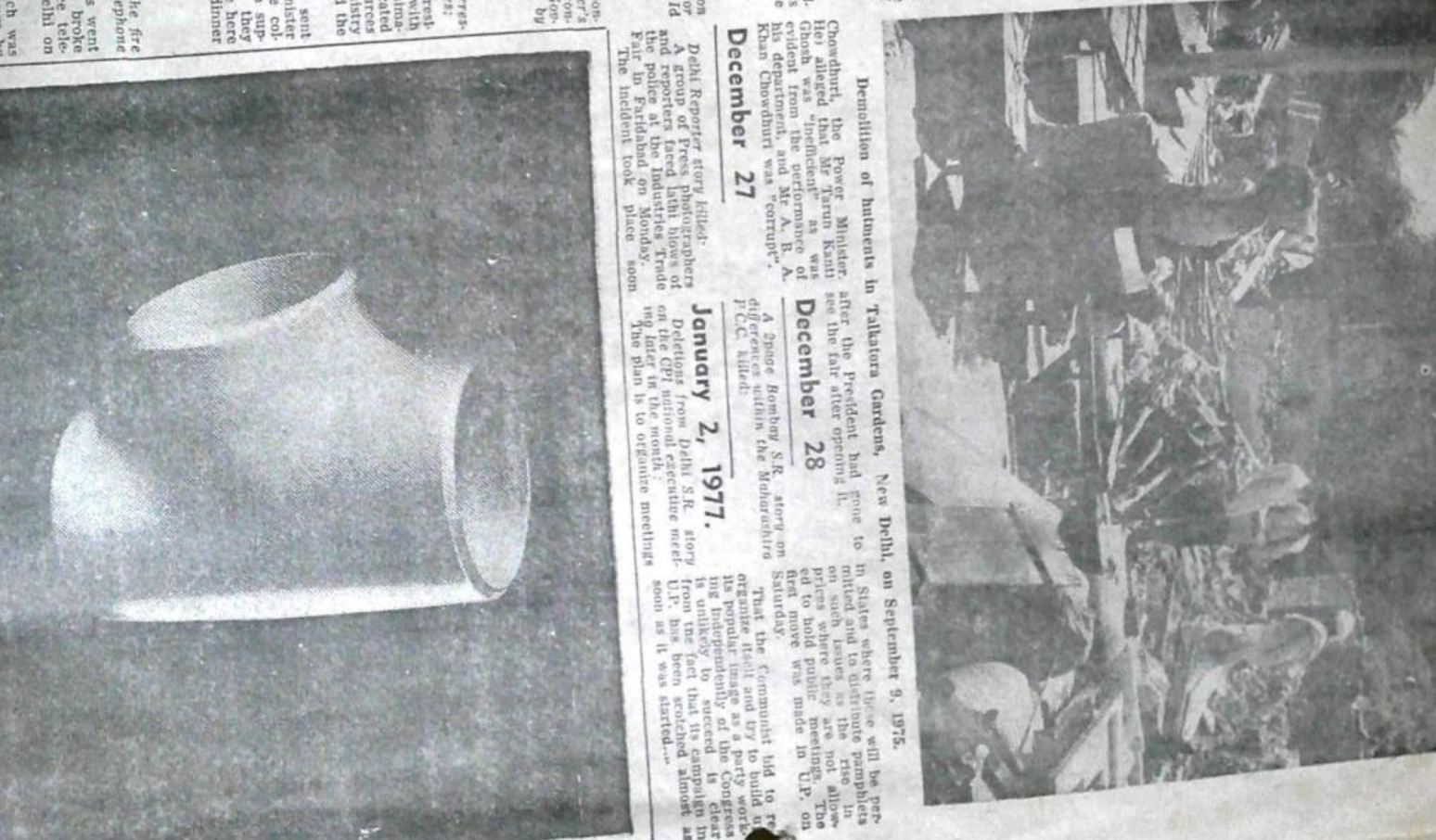

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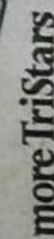

1 Killed, 38 Hurt In Delhi Curfew In Turkman Gate Area

Delhi Reporter story on Turkman Gate firing killed, 38 hurt. In the morning, some 500 local residents came to the camp and alleged that compulsory sterilization was undergoing there.

The police officer said they demanded that the camp should be closed down immediately. Meanwhile, according to him, near Turkman Gate the local people attacked the demolition squad, which was removing unauthorized structures, and created obstacles to stop them from performing their duty.

The violent crowd attacked the police with stones and lathis. However, armed police were sent to the area. The police first used tear gas to disperse the crowd. When it did not have any effect, the police opened fire.

With this, the crowd started dispersing and soon the demolition work resumed. The police continued to maintain law and order without any disturbance. Meanwhile, the police had also brought the situation in the Jama Masjid area under control. Here the police, however, confined their action to teargas only to stop heavy roofings from the side-lanes and rooftops.

However, after seeing the tense atmosphere, the district authorities decided to impose curfew as a safety measure.

An official of the demolition squad said that they had been working in the area for several days. It was on Monday when the crowd started dispersing and soon the demolition work resumed.

But they are expected to be around the same order as the previous one when an average of \$100 million annually has been collectively given by the consortium members.

(Reports suggest that the U.S. State Department is not as optimistic on improvement of Indo-U.S. relations to warrant resumption of aid as the U.S. Ambassador, Mr. Saxbe. The present situation is that each is waiting for the other to make the first move for bilateral talks on aid decisions.)

The official said that the people, whose house had been demolished, would be given alternative sites in Nand Nagari.

Members of the Border Security Force and the Central Reserve Police Force have also been deployed along with the police to maintain law and order in the area. The police station and Turkman Gate police station have been put under curfew.

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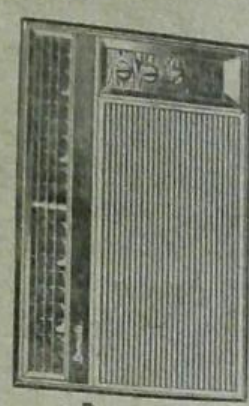
