"How many more people like Imre Nagy and Paul Maleter will have to be murdered by Khrushchev's regime in breach of faith before the amiable gentlemen at present meeting at the Anti-Nuclear Convention in Delhi and suggesting that the world lay down its arms and trust to Khrushchev's pledge to disarm come to realise the dangers of their misguided idealism?" asked Mr. M.R. Masani, General Secretary of the Swatantra Party, while addressing today a public meeting convened by the Committee for Solidarity with Hungary to pay homage to the memory of the martyrs of the Hungarian Revolution, with Mr. Frank Moraes, Sheriff of Bombay, in the Chair.

Mr. Masani recalled how the Soviet Government had given an assurance to Marshal Tito that, if former Premier Imre Nagy left the Yugoslav Legation in Budapest to go to Yugoslavia after the suppression of the Hungarian Revolution in 1956, he would not be touched and how, in breach of this assurance, Nagy was first kidnapped by Soviet secret service agents and a year and a half later executed after a so-called trial. Similarly General Paul Maleter, Commander-in-Chief of the Hungarian Army, was invited to Soviet headquarters outside Budapest in November 1956 for carrying on negotiations for a cease fire under a safe conduct issued by the Soviet command but, while the talks were proceeding, Khrushchev's men entered the room and kidnapped General Maleter, despite the protests of the Soviet Commander, and later executed him.

In the face of a long series of treaties and pledges broken by the Soviet Government since 1945, to invite the Democracies to lay down the nuclear deterrent without proper safeguards in the way of effective international verification and control is to play directly into the hands of Moscow and Peking which are poised for world conquest and whose massive land armies could then overrun the whole of Europe and Asia. "What a pity that these good people do not concentrate their protest against the Soviet Government which alone refuses to enter into an agreement which would guarantee that all Governments are made to observe the banning of the nuclear bomb," observed Mr. Masani.

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
